HE BICYCLE MASTER PLAN

Completed in 2018, the county's Bike Master Plan represents 2.5 years of review/public input. Planning staff assessed every road in the county assembled a list of recommendations with tiered priorities. The Plan was approved by the County Council in 2018.






The Department of Transportation created cost estimates for every recommendation in the Bike Master Plan.




The County spends money on bike and pedestrian safety projects, but mostly in the more affluent areas of the County.




This proposal creates networks for safe biking and walking where there are no networks currently.





Projects like this are funded through the Capital Improvements Program (CIP). The current CIP allocates \$4.3 billion for transportation over 6 years.

Of that, around \$100 million supports bike and pedestrian projects per year.



This proposal calls for an additional \$18 million per year in CIP funding for bike/ped projects—a 2.5% increase.



CIP Timeline for 2022:

- County Executive proposed budget on January 17
- Council holds hearings in February and committee worksessions in March
- Final budget negotiated in April/May

Tactic 2: Testify at Council Budget Hearings

The County Council Budget Hearings are a chance for residents to show up and share their perspective on the CIP (Capital Budget). When residents speak on the same subject, it gets attention and action.

Ask: commit \$110m over 6 years to build a more equitable bicycle network that advances Montgomery County's climate and Vision Zero goals.

What you can do
